## Cross Country Earns Second Straight Team Title


Last Saturday, the cross country team took it to Huron for the state meet. The girls took first place last year, looking to defend their title going into Saturday's race. Unfortunately they were held back, but did secure fourth place as a team.

They tried their hardest, which is all that matters. Taking thirteenth place and being the top finisher for Garretson girls, Carmel Bohl finished at a total time of 15:29.82. Shortly behind was Haley Sage at 15:48.29, placing 22nd. Rachel Kindt, 20th, ran a 16:12.49. Teisha Carnicle, 33rd, paced at a 16:17.35. Peyton Sage crossed the line at 16:53.59, finishing 55th and Jaden Bly rounded out the Garretson squad with a time of 17:47.03, 98th.

The boys also ran on Saturday. Last year they took third place as a team and were looking for a way to improve that. They did. Garretson took second place overall. Junior Evan Fick was the top finisher for Garretson, taking seventh place; he had a total time of 16:57.81. Josh Powell, 20th, finished at 17:29.15; Joshua Liester was right behind him 17:35.62, finishing 24th. Riley Nordstrom, 17:59.89, 37th; Tait Johnson, 40th, 18:03.00, and Jacob Fitzgerald, 18:34.03, 62nd rounded out the Blue Dragons' squad.

## An Apple a Day Keeps the Doctor Away

An apple a day keeps the doctor away, they always say; but what does that mean?

No, it doesn't mean if you give your doctor an apple every day, you will never have to see him/her. It means that if you eat/be healthy, you are less likely to get sick. But that isn't always the case.

What about viruses? Being super healthy doesn't have very much to do with catching a virus like the flu, but shots do. Getting a flu shot GREATLY reduces the chances you will accumulate the flu this season.

Have you gotten your flu shot yet? If not, the school is offering flu shots tonight during conferences. They are free if you are under eighteen, or \$30 for adults.

The flu is a serious disease that can lead to hospitalization and sometimes even death. Every flu season is different, and the flu affects everybody differently. Even super healthy people can get massively sick from the flu and infect others with the potentially fatal virus.

It's really important to get a flu shot if you have asthma, are a baby or small child, have diabetes, have heart or lung disease, are pregnant, are 65 or older, or live with or take care of someone at high risk because people in these categories are more susceptible to the virus. During a regular flu season, about 90 percent of deaths occur in people 65 years and older.

Over a period of 31 seasons from 1976 to 2007, estimates of flu-associated deaths in the U.S. range from about 3,000, to a high of about 49,000 people. Flu season in the U.S. can begin as early as October and last as late as May.

Fifth grader Morgan Moritz feels that flu shots aren't necessary, but at only ten years old she says she's really too scared of it to have a real opinion.

"They're scary and they hurt, not to mention you could get one at your normal doctor's office. Getting it at school is a lot of pressure, especially for a little kid like me. It's intimi-



dating with everybody around, not to mention you might not have your parents there to hold your hand," Moritz exclaimed.

Ruth Sarar, former high school English teacher, is for flu shots.

"Aside from providing a shield from the flu, I think it also provides resistance from the common cold. In the years that I've gotten a flu shot, I very rarely get a cold," commented Sarar.

Sarar also added, "I think that vaccinations prevent epidemics like we had in the 1900's that killed lots of people."

It doesn't matter if you're for or against flu shots, you should do the safe thing and get one anyways. It's worth the time and slightly sore spot for a day or two. The last thing you want to do is spread the flu around the school to everybody who never got a shot.

Joey Clark commented, "My heart was with Kansas, but my money was on San Francisco."


It was a great run by the underdogs, but unfortunately, it was stopped short. Now it is just a countdown until spring training.
