National Park Service celebrates 100 years

The NPS has grown to oversee more than 1200 national locations including parks, recreational areas, and monuments

This summer the National Park Service commended commemorated 100th year anniversary on August 25th with a celebration. They started off their second century with recreation, conservation, and historic preservation curriculums.

The founders of the National Park service programs were Horace M. Albright, John Muir, Stephen Mather, and presidents Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson.

It all started with the Act of March 1, 1872. Congress established Yellowstone Park in the territories of Montana and Wyoming. The founding of Yellowstone started a national park movement. Now there are 1,200 national parks across the United States!

On August 25th, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill that would create the National Park Service. The purpose of this was to protect all, at the time 35, national parks and monuments.

The United States mint collaborated with the National Park Service by making three limited edition coins. The coins are a five dollar gold coin, a silver dollar, and a fifty cent coin. The designs feature pioneers in the National Park foundation as well as the logo and scenes from some of the national parks.

Also the United States Postal Service joined in on the fun by issuing 16 new stamps. The designs were released earlier this year in April.

The National Park Service also oversees monuments, recreational sites and historic places and trails.

South Dakota has seven places marked as a national park, monument, historic site or trail, or recreational site. The two national parks are Badlands and Windcave. The Lewis & Clark historic trail runs through South Dakota as well as 10 other states. Minuteman Missile is a national historic site located in southwestern South Dakota. The Missouri

river serves as a national recreational river. What South Dakota is best known for, Mount Rushmore is one of two national monuments. The other is Jewel Cave in Custer, SD.

The National Park Service is a strong organization that has been very successful and hopefully it continues to be for as long as possible.

According to Aanenson, there have been plenty of vandalisms and thefts throughout the summer months. Earlier this season, there was some damage done up at the pool that consisted of chairs being thrown into the water, gates broken, and things thrown into the kiddy pool.

There was also an incident uptown that included some inappropriate words and images painted onto the side of a building.

Whether or not these events were linked, the major question is why people are drawn to partaking in these devious acts. No matter if it's just an act brought out by extreme boredom or just by the mere pleasure of breaking things, if people would just stop and think before they do disastrous things, not only would Garretson be a better place, the world would be a better place.

The girls are still in the process of adjusting to a new line-up where only one player, Emily Schleuter, has had any significant experience on the varsity court. In addition, the team was missing

For those of you that aren't familiar with the 4-H organization, a state ambassador is one of the greatest accomplishments one could receive. State ambassadors serve as the face of 4-H all across Minnesota throughout the year.

Their duties at the state fair included greeting fair-goers as they entered the 4-H building, selling Minnesota 4-H merchandise at the Clover-Mart and helping with livestock and performing art shows.

Each county could send one delegate to run and one more as a voter for your county."

After that, the delegate attended YELLO! and the new ambassadors were elected at the conclusion of that conference. Each person ran for an office such as treasurer or president in their region and if they achieved that office, they would become a state ambassador. "It was pretty much a popularity contest," said Buchholz.

The team that year decided to change the application process to it's current format. "They wanted to represent the whole population of 4-Hers and include the quieter leaders." mentioned Buchholz.

Flanagan's accomplishment of being selected as a state ambassador is not one many can tout. Numbers in the low twenties are selected each year out of the hundreds of applicants and thousands of 4-Hers in Minnesota.
