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Something new is shooting into town

Trap Shooting is now offered as an activity to Garretson students

With Garretson being a small town, it always exciting to hear when something new hits in. On April 19th, the official Trap Shooting practice started at the Garretson Sportsmen's Club.

Andy Hermanson is the head coach for the nine students particpating this year for Garretson. Along with three assistant coaches, Woody Gnadt, Markell Gnadt and Dallas Westover who, along with Hermanson, are lifelong hunters and shooting enthusiasts. Trap Shooting is run as a club sport similar to baseball, so it is not a sanctioned high school sport.

"I started shooting when I was seven, so when I heard that there would be a league in Garretson, I saw it as another oppurtunity to

shoot," sophomore Ben Konechne, a member of this year's Target Clay League said.

Hermanson explained that Trap Shooting, also known as a Clay Target League, is a shooting that uses shotguns. Clay targets are shot from a machine that comes in at different angles. A round of trap includes 25 targets where each shooter in a squad, a full squad is five shooters, takes aim at the five targets from the different shooting positions.

"The league started in SD last year and was little known. I had a coworker that started a team in Brookings and wanted to start a team here as well. Also, the league reached out to the Garretson Sportsmen's Club where I am a member. We worked together and then approached the school to get permission to be affiliated with the league, which is a requirement." Hermanson, head coach

explained as to how it all started.

The team has practice two days a week, Sunday afternoon and Tuesday night. Competitions are always based at their own shooting range. They compete with the schools in the conference which are Bon Homme, Dakota Valley, Getttysburg and Hot Springs. But there are a total of four conferences in South Dakota.

If anyone is interested for next year contact Andy Hermanson. Like all other high school sports, there will be a State Tournament. It takes place in Aberdeen on June 10th.



FFA succeeds at state convention

Multiple success show hard work and dedication during the school year pay off

This week 28 Garretson FFA members went to Brookings. They participated in the FFA State Convention, which was held at South Dakota State University from Sunday, April 23 to Tuesday, April 25. More than 2,000 students from all over South Dakota took part in the Convention.

The Garretson FFA members competed in 11 different contests out of the 15 contests held. These were judging milk quality, veterinary science, natural resources, agronomy, dairy cattle, livestock judging, horse judging, food science, floriculture, agricultural mechanics and meat judging.

Moriah Flanagan applied for a state office as one of 24 applicants, but did not get selected.

A couple members of the Garretson FFA chapter earned proficiency awards, which are based on supervised agriculture experience projects. Jaden Flanagan took first place and Emily Malsom took third place in the proficiency awards for vegetable gardening production.

Like last year, Claire Longhenry, who has been in love with horses since she got her first pony when she was five years old, took first out of more than 200 contestants in horse judging.

Parts of the contest were a general knowledge test, the horse judging itself and the oral interpretations, in which the participants had to explain why they ranked the four horses in each of the classes the way

they did it. She said, "You have to give reasons for your judging and get scored on that. That is a big part of judging; that's really what separates you and other contestants."

The Garretson floriculture team, consisting of Angel Larson, Malsom and Nobel Nothstine, placed first overall. Nothstine placed third out of more than 170 competitors. She said, "I really liked doing the arrangements there, because they always have a good variety of flowers, that I don't get to see a lot, especially in a small town. The most exciting part of the convention was actually being up on stage and hearing I was in the top 10."

Malsom took fourth and got a 92 on her test (people rarely get above

50 percent). In order to prepare she went over old tests. "The trick study in that, is to go through, read the quesand then you read the answer, but you don't read any of the other options. That way that is the only answer you know, that relates to that question,"

shared Malsom.

Looking at the overall performance, FFA advisor Mrs. Kientopf said, "The kids did awesome. They have earned what they've deserved. These kids have pushed themselves. I hope they have seen themselves succeed and see the growth they've made. I hope they see the future that they have as well, because this is just a beginning."

Other strong performances came from Keisean Deehr-Thorton (2nd in 400m dash), Jack Konechne (2nd in 800m run), and Trevor Fiegen (3rd place in high jump).



preparing for the contest for the past three months to perfect the aspects in which we are judged on at contests including tone, intonation, articulation, style, and facial expression.


"I believe we did exceptionally well. Our choir put out the best and in the end we received a fairly impressive score," senior Abriana Scholl stated.
