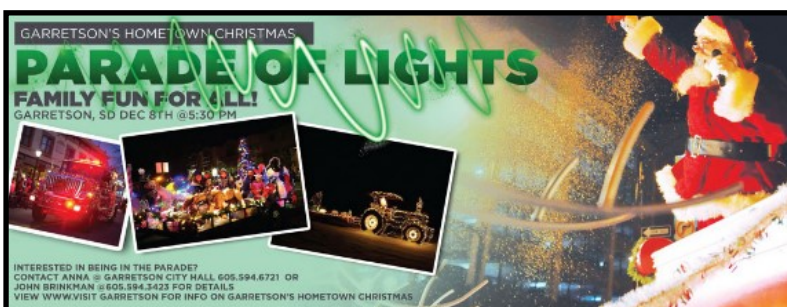

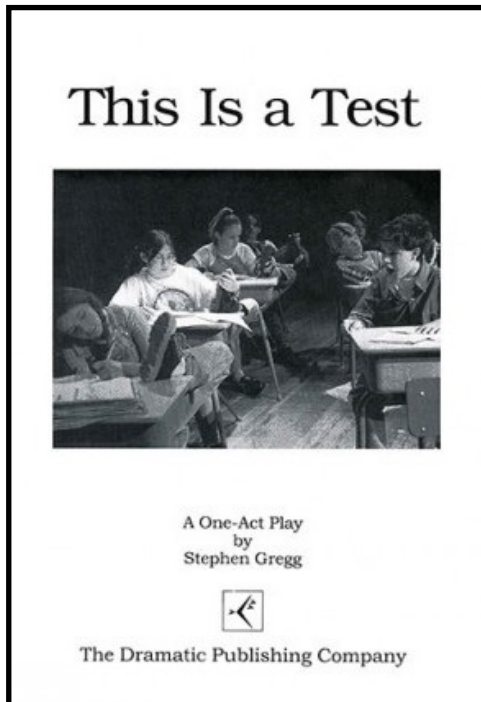

Solar excitement

This past Monday NASA had their 850 million InSight Lander (very powerful drill) successfully land on Mars to study more about its interior surface. Insight Lander's mission is to uncover some of the many mysteries our solar system has including a better understanding of the makeup of the red planet.

As we all know, Mars has been a big focus in space exploration because it could be the next place humans live, if it's survivable. NASA wanted to do something different to help contribute to the idea of humans having the ability to reside in a different planet. The Insight Lander is the first drill NASA has ever sent to Mars and will be landing on a very flat area called Elysium Planitia, past space crafts that have landed on

Mars have always been rovers. Insight is also solar power so their hoping since Elysium Planitia is close to the equator, it'll keep it running for the full two years it's there for.

Over the course of 40 days the drill will get 16 feet deep, and will be checking the planet's interior surface and see the chemical makeup of the soil. Occasionally during drilling it will shoot up heat which is how they can calculate how much chemical makeup they will be dealing with on Mars. Past drills they had could only go half an inch into the ground.

While drilling, Insight will send out shock waves and check for underground lava at different depths, and measure how much Mars wobbles on its axis. If the core is made out of liquid metal, then will be a lot of wobble, but if there is a solid metal core, there basically no wobble at all, due to the Earth's solid core.
