

The celebration of Black History Month reaches its 110th anniversary in 2019

"You have as much right as anyone else in this world and to be in any profession you want ... you don't have to wait for permission". - Mae C. Jemison.

On September 12, 1992, Mae Jemison became the first ever African-American female to travel to space. In honor of Black History Month, the Garretson Blue Ink will recognize one person each week that has impacted the African-American community. Born on October 17, 1756, Jemison soon obtained a passion for science and was determined to become one. At the age of 16, she started attending Stanford University in which she gained her bachelor of science in chemical engineering as well as a bachelor of arts in African and African-American studies. She then attained her doctorate in medicine from the Cornell University and worked as a practitioner, she volunteered for the Peace Corps.

Father faces charges after daughter is found

Last Saturday, a father was charged with rape after missing Tennessee girl is found in Wisconsin. The girl disappeared over two weeks ago and was last seen January 13 at her home in Madisonville, Tennessee. Randal Pruitt, who adopted the girl, was arrested and charged on Thursday, January 31 for rape.

The 14-year old girl was found with a stranger she met online named Bryan Rogers. When she told the 31-year old that she was being sexually assaulted at home, Rogers told her to send a video of the alleged rape and abuse. After receiving the video he drove to her house and picked her up. He smashed her phone so she couldn't be tracked and avoided tollways and gas stations with surveillance.

The girl was found in Rogers house six hours after he told the FBI she wasn't there. They found the video of her father sexually assaulting her on Rogers computer. They charged Pruitt with rape and charged Rogers with sexual exploiting a child. The girl is not being named to the public because she is a victim of sexual assault.

9-year old, Serenity Dennard, has also been missing for about a week. She was last seen leaving the Children's Home Society in Rapid City, SD. The search has transitioned to a recovery effort. Anyone who sees Serenity or has contact with her should call 605-394-6135 immediately.
