With regular season basketball all wrapped up, we've now hit regions. Garretson boys and girls are competing out of Class A, Region 3. The Girls faced off against Baltic on Monday in Garretson, and boy ballers faced off against West Central in Hartford on Tuesday. The Lady BlueDragons (12-8) balled out in the Dragons' Lair on Monday beating Baltic (3-17) 62-31 in the first round of the region tournament.

The next day the Garretson boys (3-17) traveled to Hartford to duel with West Central (13-7). Garretson was the obvious underdog in the rankings, but it didn't look like it on the court, Garretson won (52-53).

"We were all working as a team, everyone doing their part and not getting upset with each other and picking another player up if they messed up on a play, as opposed to Friday we are going to try to keep doing what coach has been telling us, move the ball, have good shot selections, and work hard on defense," stated junior baller Cole Skadsen.

The boys advanced to the Elmen Center for the second round for the first time in seven years.

"We've been focusing a lot on moving the ball, taking

time off the shot clock and having good shot selections, and on the defensive side we've been focusing on talking and forcing the opposing team into bad shot selections," added Skadsen.

Last night, the Lady Dragons (12-8) traveled to Tea to face the undefeated West Central Girls (20-0). The game was an even battle throughout the first half with the score at 20-27.

West Central kept momentum in the third quarter with Garretson trailing by 20. The Blue Dragons started to claw their way back, but there was not enough time on the clock. Garretson fell to West Central 56-45.

Once again the boys will square off against Dell Rapids tonight at 8:00 at the Elmen Center. The theme is throw-back Garretson Gear.

# Pinning down another season of wrestling

Last week, the seven qualifiers: Hayden Pierret, Dakota Johnson, Ben Konenche, Dominic Abraham, Isiah Robinson, Jayce Miller and Preston Bohl, headed to the State Tournament in Rapids City for what hoped to be a weekend of success, but was a defeat for most. Here's an insight to our wrestlers mind.

Senior Hayden Pierret has been wrestling for 13 years and was the only one who placed in this year's tournament after an arm injury. During the tournament, Pierret defeated his opponent in his first match with a pin after approximately five minutes. His second match was against the # 2 ranked wrestler in the state in which Hayden was defeated. Pierret's third match is what proceeds onto being placed. Not wanting his season to end just yet, Pierret beat his opponent with a score of 6-3. On Saturday morning, after making a mistake, his opponent pinned him which took him to his final match of being placed 7/8. Pierret went up against his very first opponent of the tournament, who proceeded to use Pierret's injured arm against him to beat him which put Hayden in 8th place. After having a few offers to wrestle, Pierret is undecided of what's to come for the future.

**Q: With having gone to state before, how do you think you were more prepared than usual?**

A: When I wrestled State my freshman and sophomore year, I was nervous and didn't know what to expect. I was more prepared, especially with it being my senior year; I needed to go out with a bang.

**Q: Is there anything you would change about how your matches went?**

A: Not having a hurt elbow would've been nice, but there were simple mistakes that I made that cost me some matches.

**Q: What were some highlights of your season?**

A: To be honest I wouldn't say I had any. I had my ups and downs this season and didn't wrestle like my usual self. My coaches and family helped me get out of the my slump which helped me get to State.

**Q: With it being your last high school season to wrestle, what are some things you're going to miss? Do you have advice or anything to say to the younger wrestlers?**

A: Do not take anything for granted. I always hated having to cut weight and practice, but after my last match, it hurt. Cherish every moment that you get to play, because you never know when it could be your last match.

Senior Dakota Johnson has wrestled for the past two years, and after graduation, he will be playing football at Northwestern University. During the tournament, "first match was very competitive, and pretty even. Wrestled really well the first 2 periods but, last one I really lost it off dumb decision I did, which I was not happy with myself about. Second match had forfeit. Last match, I wrestled kid from Groton, who then went on to place 3rd. I didn't wrestle my best, and I really felt like I should of placed, but otherwise went 1-2 overall."

**Q: With it being your first time, how do you think you performed?**

A: I was very nervous at first, but after the first period it felt like just a big tournament. I wrestled well at times, but really felt like I should have placed.

**Q: there anything you would change about how your matches went?**

A: It's in the past, nothing you can change. Only

thing is I would have wished was to wrestle a little smarter.

**Q: What were some highlights of your season?**

A: Making state, Competing at high levels, Regions was fun, and all the guys competed at high level.

**Q: With it being your last high school season to wrestle, what are some things you're going to miss? Do you have advice or anything to say to the younger wrestlers?** A: I will miss the coaches and the hard work wrestling causes on your body mentally and physically and well I will miss the younger guys. My advice is no matter how hard it gets, stick through it because you will regret it if you quit and will miss it when you realize it's all over.

Ben Konenche has wrestled for the majority of his life, and his senior year peaked as it was his first year making it to State. Konenche, disappointed by his performance throughout lost his first match, won his second but fell short in his third match by only 2 points. Konenche stated if he were to wrestle in college, it would be a pick between Augustana University and Northern State University.

A: I did not perform well

Freshman Jayce Miller: In his first match, Miller lost his match by a few points, in his second gained a win with a score of 6-4. For his final match, Miller went up against a hard opponent which resulted to a loss of 8-2. Satisfied with his performance, but wanting to be more aggressive, Miller is ready to once again experience the greatness of going to State.

Sophomore Isiah Robinson: During the tournament, Robinson lost his first match against a #2 ranked state wrestler, and then gained another loss after a close match of 3-2. After stating that there is always more room for improvement, he is motivated to make State to do better and win more.

Sophomore Dominic Abraham; After placing 3rd in Regions, Abraham lost both his matches during State, but is determined to make State again next year to continue his streak.

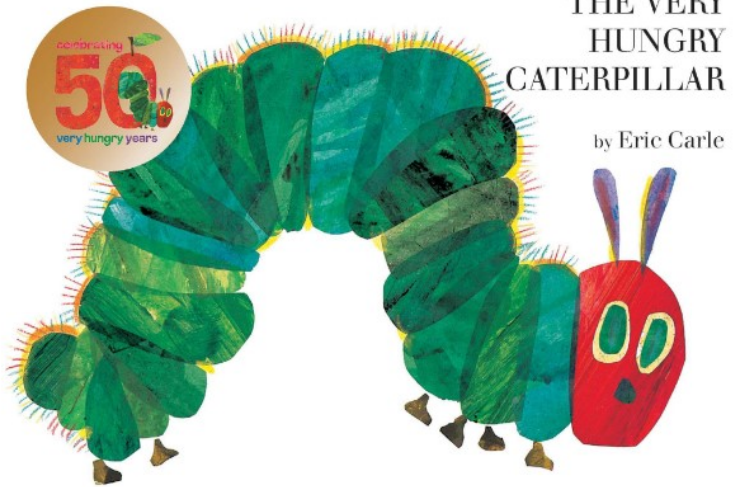


# We all get hungry

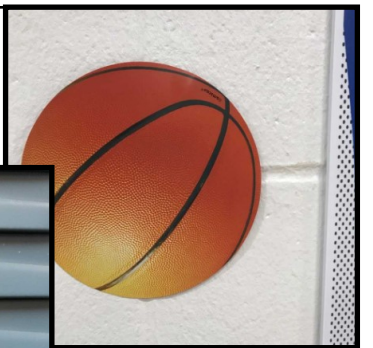

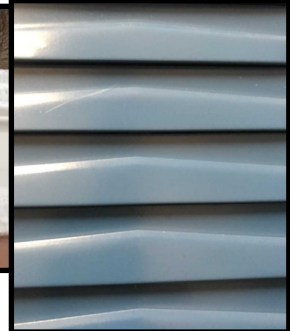

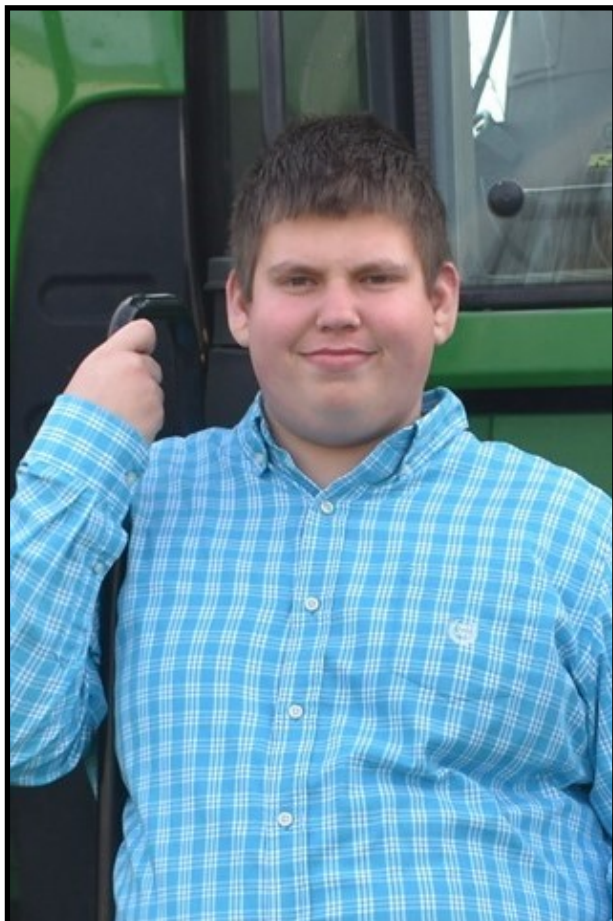
