

Unless you plan on being a couch potato for the rest of your life, you may need this. If you plan on attending an educational institution after high school, chances are, you'll need this too; and you'll most definitely need this skill if you plan on vacationing or even living in a foreign country!

Maybe you have a relative you can't "normally" communicate with... or maybe you're just doing it for the required credits in school. Hey, it looks good on a college application form and a job resume.



Why, learning a second (or third) language of course!

Learning another language is more beneficial than you may think. Not only are you giving your brain a workout, but you're becoming a better you.

By studying a foreign language, a whole new world of opportunities will open its doors for you.

You can travel the world comfortably, knowing that you can effectively communicate with people who may share no cultural or historical similarities with you. You can interact and have good times in an alien place, not feeling scared or intimidated, like you would if you had no way of fluently communicating with those around you.

Learning another language may push you to want to explore and venture the globe-which can lead to long-lasting friendships with peoples of other cultures and nationalities; it can also give one the chance to see amazing sites like the Eiffel Tower, the Roman coliseum, or the Great Wall of China.

If you do some research, or if you have personal experience with it yourself, most people would say that learning a foreign language helps you learn and understand your own native tongue better.

Whether you take a language course online or go the traditional way in a classroom, you're still picking up a new skill some people would give anything to have.

Garretson offers five different language courses for high school students from which to choose: Spanish, French, German, Chinese, and Latin. Spanish is accessible upstairs with Miss Gaspar, or it is available online while the other four languages are only feasible online.

For me, since I'm currently studying German in school and Korean on my own, on top of trying to master English, I think of studying foreign languages as simply learning new ways to say things. Sophomore Kyrstyn Beck answered a few questions about learning a new language. She's in her first year of the online German course. When I asked her why she chose to take German, she said, "Because I can't roll my tongue for Spanish!"

Beck stated that the most rewarding part about learning a new language was, "The achievement of actually learning a different language... I get the feeling of selfaccomplishment; that feels good. It gives me a feeling that I've gone beyond my reach. But it's kind of hard to learn on a computer... I think it'd be better if I had a teacher."

Regardless if there's a teacher present or not, learning a second language can be a valuable tool for oneself for current and future disposal.

Learning two additional languages has taught me self-discipline and values I would not have otherwise learned first hand if I hadn't sparked interest in linguistics. Being curious about other cultures and dialects enough to research and learn about them has opened my eyes and my mind. I believe it has made me a tolerant, more understanding individual.

I hope that after reading this editorial, some of you will consider looking into mastering another language as well. Because I know that after I finish German 2 this year, next year, I'm going to try and learn a fourth language: Chinese!


When asking Mikaela Gilbert if she minded morning rehearsals, she said, "Yes, I like my sleep."

Lori has organized and instructed the "Good News Club" for several years.


