Car caution a priority with summer heat

The heat can be enjoyable but comes with dangers too

It's getting to the time of the year where the sun is out and the cars are hot. Driving around and being outside in the sun is a nice feeling, but not for the animals and children trapped inside steaming hot cars.

Each year thousands of animals suffer from heat strokes and suffocation because they are left alone in hot vehicles. Even with windows cracked the temperature inside the vehicle can rise from 80 degrees to 112 in less than thirty minutes.

Sophomore Kendra Kleven has 2 dogs and they love to go on car rides with her. "I bring my dogs on car rides about twice a month, and they love it. Whenever I go inside I leave my dogs in the vehicle. I crack the

window a couple inches and I try to hurry back out."

A recent petition states that leaving animals alone in a vehicle can be very dangerous and in hard conditions can be considered a form of animal abuse. If an animal is seen stuck inside a vehicle ASPCA is saying NOT to break the window. Instead the witness should locate the owner. If the owner can not be found they at to call 911 and wait by the vehicle until authorities arrive.

Children are also affected by heat strokes during the summer. Each year about 37 kids die from heat stroke because they are stuck inside of hot vehicles. NoHeatStroke.org has been collecting data since 1998 and since then the highest deaths per year occurred in 2010 when 49 children died. The lowest was 5

years later in 2015 with only 24 child deaths from heat strokes.

Many of the hotter states have the most deaths from 1998-2015: Texas (100), Florida (72), California (44), Arizona (30), and North Carolina (24). As of 2017 there was a total of 19 states that had laws saying it was illegal to leave children alone in a vehicle. According to CNN 87% of the victims trapped inside of the vehicle are 3 years old or younger.

Many states including South Dakota have a Good Samaritan Law: this makes it legal for a person to save a child who is stuck inside of a hot vehicle if needed, as long as it is in good faith. The Good Samaritan Law does not apply to any animals in a vehicle, in those cases it's better to call 911 and wait for authorities to arrive.

Trump backs US out of Iran nuclear deal

Future is uncertain after questionable move by Trump

President Donald Trump backed the United States out of the Iran nuclear deal which was established in 2015. The deal was formed by the P5+1, which is U.S., Britain, France, Russia, China, and Germany. Trump said on Tuesday that he was re-imposing sanctions on part of Iran's oil sector which was part of the original deal, forcing the U.S. to completely pull out.

Trump has held a disapproving view of the Iran deal since its establishment and stated he would put an

end to it if he won the election. Countries around the world pleaded with the U.S. President to stay in the agreement, but Trump tuned them out.

Trump said, "We cannot prevent an Iranian bomb under the decaying and rotten structure of the current agreement therefore, I am announcing today that the United States will withdraw from the Iran nuclear deal."

Even with the U.S. pulling out of the deal, it is not instantly ended since the other five countries are remaining part of it and keeping their sanctions off. Iran announced

on Monday that they would stay in the deal and continue to comply with the restrictions. The backing out could also have adverse effects on allies such as Israel who are not on good terms with Iran.

The removal of the U.S. from the Iran deal has come with negative feedback from countries and their leaders. Nobody is certain of what Iran will do meaning this move could lead to their development of a nuclear bomb, leaving the U.S. with two options. Let Iran build a nuclear bomb, or start a war in an attempt to stop it.

Hawaiian and Super Volcanoes

Panic has spread through Hawaii due to the risk that its most active volcano, Kilauea, has a high risk of "explosive eruptions."

Drone footage showed a streak of lava slithering its way through forest land and heading toward a town called Pahoa. Due to this the Governor of Hawaii has declared a mandatory evacuation, of civilizations in the area, including Leilani Estates, Makamae, Ho'okupu, Kaupili, Mohala, and lower Leilani Streets.

About 1700 residents live in these towns and are being forced to evacuate, but over 10,000 people live in vicinity of the volcano. The Governor of Hawaii requested the aid of National Guard to help with evacuations. They are now using a nearby community center as a shelter for people who are evacuated.

Last week there was a small eruption at the volcano, and earthquakes spread through the island, the highest magnitude it reached was magnitude 5. On Thursday, the eruption started in the late afternoon, lava burst and splashed for about two hours. The eruption damaged lots of trees but no severe damage to civilizations.

After the eruption things have been on cool down and there hasn't been signs of another eruption, but scientists have told residents to monitor the situation closely if that were not the case.

It is very well known that an inactive supervolcano lies underneath the national park of Yellowstone. But, this inactive volcano may not stay inactive for very long. The world's tallest geyser keeps erupting, this is odd because it rarely erupts.

The eruptions dispersed about 200 to 400 cubic meters of water each explosion which is about 10 times more than Ol' Faithful.

Before these eruptions the last time it had erupted was September, of 2014. These are signs that could lead to the eruption of the supervolcano that lies under Yellowstone, even though it is not predicted to erupt for about 1000 years.

The odds of this volcano erupting in any given year is about 730,000 to one. If this volcano were to erupt, ash would be spread everywhere within about 500 miles of Yellowstone. It would put South Dakota in about 4 inches of grey ash, this would destroy all of our crops.

After the explosion, it would disperse of tons of gasses, out of these gasses, sulfur dioxide is one of them. Sulfur oxide is a gas that can block the sun and cause the earth to cool down, it is also very damaging to our atmosphere. Scientists are monitoring this volcano very closely for any signs of this explosion.


overall with a score of 119.
