Hurricane Florence set to make landfall today


Hurricane Florence is said to affect more than 10 million during the week in the southeastern U.S as it hit the Carolinas. Once a category 3 hurricane then upgraded to category 4 an hour later has been downgraded to a category 1 hurricane as it is predicted to hit the eastern coast tonight.

The classification category one means that it has up to 74 mile per

hour winds. Meaning that for the most part it is expected to do minor damage to property during the storm.

However just because it is category one storm does not mean it will not be dangerous. In 2012 Hurricane Isaac, a category 1 storm, lasted from August 21 to September 1. Isaac's path included Haiti, Cuba, southern Mississippi and southern

Louisiana.

Isaac caused \$2.8 billion in estimated damage during this time. With a death toll of 34: five in the US, five in the Dominican Republic, and 24 in Haiti; Isaac, a category one hurricane, was still dangerous storm.

At the moment the storm is about 10 miles east of Wilmington North Carolina and 80 miles east of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina according to the National Hurricane Center as of Friday morning.

Florence is moving west at 6 mph and has maximum sustained winds of 90 mph. The Hurricane-force winds reach as far out as 80 miles outward from the center of the storm and the tropical force winds can be felt up to 400 miles away, about the size of the whole state of South Dakota.

With a combination of the hurricane and the tide, normally dry areas near the coast will be flooded by rising waters moving inland from the shoreline. Water levels could reach as high as 11 feet from Cape Fear to Cape Lookout, North Carolina.

Second grade class raises, releases butterflies

Ms. Neugebauer brings back favorite using monarchs to teach metamorphosis, life cycle

Ms. Neugebauer's 2nd grade class started a butterfly project to give students a hands-on experience with a butterfly's migration period and its life cycle.

Ms. Neugebauer begins preparation for this in the summer. She will go at the end of July to start collecting caterpillars; she even lets students bring in their own caterpillars.

The students' have been learning a lot from Ms. Neugebauer. Not only are they observing metamorphosis in action and finding the joys of scientific discovery but the students get to release the butterflies as well.

Ms. Neugebauer wanted to show her students what she's learned and teach the students about how to tell if butterflies are female or male and if their poisonous or not. Ms.

Neugebauer loves to see the reaction of the students and the students love doing the project as well.

"The students and I have a wonderful time doing [this project] and it makes for a great learning experience," said Neugebauer.

The students put a sticker on the right wing at the bottom of one of the petals before releasing it. This sticker helps researchers track butterfly migration as well as identify the butterflies' gender. Some butterflies travel

over 3000 miles during their migration. The monarch butterflies, prima-

ry species being released in Ms. Neugebauer's class, typically voyage to Mexico.

"Some of the students during recess will chase them around the play ground," Ms. Neugebauer said about how much fun they've been having.

The students like to have a little fun when releasing the butterflies, some letting the insects lift off from their hands, others choosing a nose as the butterfly's launch pad. Ms. Neugebauer and

her second graders have released almost a dozen butterflies so far.

Washington Post executive journalist releases book chronicling President Trump's Administration


The author of many political books, such as All the President's Game, released his most polarizing book yet. Out of all the days in the year, ironically on September 11, Bob Woodward released Fear: Trump in the White House. Instantly there were backlash and critiques defending Trump and the administration after some scandalous details were released.

Many critics including President Trump himself have come after Woodward to bash on his credibility as a writer. Bob

Woodward has worked for the Washington Post since 1971 and won the Pulitzer Prize in '73 on his work, with journalist Carl Bernstein, on the Watergate Scandal against former President Nixon. Nixon had hired people to run a campaign of burglary, sabotage and more for his 1972 reelection.

Fear has released many secrets untold such as one where President Trump considered declaring that he was withdrawing family members of US troops from South Korea, and by doing that would possibly encourage the idea of WWII. "The flames were over the tops of trees, 50-foot high, right here on the shoulder on both sides of Interstate 5," said Sgt. Tim Hinkson of the California Highway Patrol as reported by the *LA Times*. The California Fires have become very large at 410,203 acres but are 98% contained as of September 5, 2018.

There are over six thousand different fires throughout the state but the main ones are Delta, Snell, and Irving. These three have burned a total of about 1.5 million acres of land. The smoke from these fires have reached halfway across the country to Sioux Falls which has had a really negative effect on air quality across the nation. In California as the skies are turned orange and here at home, haziness from both the California and Canadian wildfires this summer have taken its toll visually and physically.

The firefighters are working hard doing 24 hour shifts for days at a time. They have at least four firefighters deployed in each area including a team leader. Even though the fire is miles away from any residences, they are suppressing it the best they could possibly can to control any flare ups.

I-5, the major roadway running down the state of California that was closed in areas due to the fire's proximity, is now re-opened as of September 12, 2018. Delays are still expected as crews are still fighting over 53,000 acres of forest fire.

These fires were expected to burn until the end of August but it's the middle of September and those flames are still blazing.

Off duty police officer shoots man in own apartment

On Saturday, September 8th, a Dallas woman made a choice that will impact her life forever. Four-year veteran police officer, Amber Guyger, wandered into an apartment she believed was hers and saw an unfamiliar face. That face was a 26 year old man, Botham Jean; the man died at the hospital after receiving a gunshot wound to the torso.

Guyger was the caller for 911, but was arrested on terms of manslaughter (the killing of a person without any prior thought) but her charges might change due to questions being raised by her statements. Guyger claims that she gave verbal warnings to Jean before opening fire, but he ignored them. Guyger then let out two shots one hitting his torso.

Multiple stories from neighbors have been shared as well, one neighbor stated all she heard was gunshots and a woman crying for the police, while another stated they had heard a woman pounding on a door trying to be let inside, even though it was reported the front door was unlocked.

Detectives are investigating if this could actually be a murder case. Officers are also exploring the options that she may have been under the influence of alcohol or drugs, if the two had any prior beef, or even if Guyger was sleep deprived. All these things could play a factor in her trial due to a shaky story.

The funeral for Jean was held yesterday where friends and family talked about how they met him and told stories from his short life. CNN interviewed his family and found out they are worried that she won't get the justice she deserves, and wishes she would just come clean. More details to come later on as more information is being uncovered every day.
